What Will You Do with That Freedom?

In 1995, Mel Gibson starred in Braveheart, an Academy Award winning film about the life of Scottish knight, William Wallace. Much of the dialog is fictitious and full of creative license, but there's one scene that always stirs my

heart. Before the Battle of Stirling Bridge, the first real battle of the First War of Scottish Independence, the movie depicts Wallace addressing his army. He says: "I am William Wallace. And I see a whole army of my countrymen here in defiance of tyranny. You have come to fight as free men, and free men you are. What would you do with that freedom?" (emphasis added)

In Galatians chapter 5, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, St. Paul writes these words: "For freedom, Christ has set you free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (Gal. 5:1a). Everything about the mission, ministry, and message of Christ is about freedom. The sick are freed from their illnesses. Sinners are freed from their sins. Some are freed even from death! Jesus' whole mission was an operation of liberation! By Baptism, you have been freed from worrying about your sins because they are forgiven through Christ's death. You have been freed from the fear of death because Christ is risen, and death is not the end. You have been from the power of the devil because Christ has defeated him with His perfect obedience to the Law. Forgiveness, eternal life, and salvation are yours. Freedom for all eternity!

What will you do with that freedom?

Some will squander that freedom. They'll bury it in the backyard like the wicked servant in The Parable of the Talents. Some will take their freedom and hoard it for themselves, keeping themselves safe and not caring at all for those who are around them. They'll present their dirt-covered talent to their Savior and be welcomed into His presence. But, perhaps in the back of their minds they might wonder...

What could I have done with that freedom?

Here's what the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther says we should do with this freedom in his "Treatise on Christian Liberty": "To make the way smoother for the unlearned—for only them do I serve—I shall set down the following two propositions concerning the freedom and the bondage of the spirit: A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all" (emphasis added). This means that every Christian is set free from the things I listed above. They are perfectly free lords of their lives; they can do whatever they wish. This freedom is the gift of God in Jesus Christ. And, Luther tells us what we should do with our freedom, that is, serve our neighbors. In this freedom from Christ, our wills align with His will

and we serve others in our homes, in our families, in our congregation, and in our community. We don't abuse our freedom and use it as an excuse. Instead we lean into that freedom and use it in ways that are Godpleasing and kingdom-expanding.

What will we do with our freedom? We will use it to free others from the same terrors that we have been freed from. We will preach the Gospel as St. Francis of Assisi tells us, "Always preach the gospel and, if necessary, use words." Our actions of service and care for our communities will prepare hearts to hear the life giving Word of Jesus Christ.

This is what we will do with that freedom.

An Introduction to Mt. Calvary Finances

Have you been confused by the financial portions of our Congregational meetings? Are you wondering what different funds, like the cans and memorials, are being used for? Do you wonder how we can be "behind" on finances and yet we are able to do new things?

Church finances can be confusing so this article is an attempt to clear up some misunderstandings and educate you about monies that Mt. Calvary has that may help you on in your walk with Christ. Here's a simple breakdown of the different funds we use.

The General Fund: Think of this as the church's "checking account." Our regular offerings are deposited here, and we use it for the regular expenses of the congregation, including salaries, ministries, and repairs that are approved in the annual budget each November. This fund sees the most activity and volatility. Because of this, our treasurer tries to keep three to six months' worth of expenses in this account. This helps us to absorb the ebb and flow of the year.

Special Funds: Sometimes people will give gifts to the church that "have strings attached," that is, they are for a specific purpose. When this happens, we call these funds "special funds." These monies can only be used for the specific purpose for which they were given. Think of these like we're saving these resources for a special purpose. Just like families may save money for a bigger purpose, these special funds are being saved for a specific purpose. An example of a special fund is the Joshua Fund, which is money designated for repairs of the building. One minor exception is memorial funds, which we'll talk about next.

Memorial Funds: These are gifts that are given by families in memory of loved ones. We want to do our best to honor the memory of those loved ones, so the Memorial Committee recommends things that are durable and long-lasting; we try not to use these funds for general expenses or repairs. If these memorials aren't spent often or quickly is because we're trying to make sure that they are used responsibly in a way to honor those whose memory they represent.

Cans Fund: Another example of a special fund is the Cans Fund. The money that we collect from the "Cans for Christ" shed go into this fund. Originally, this was started to raise a few hundred dollars to help with Vacation Bible School decorations. It has since grown beyond this original intent. We've pivoted the use of these funds to help the people of Mt. Calvary, not the building. Over the last few years, we've used this fund to buy food for our Wednesday LIFE meals and to offer financial assistance for kids to go to camp or adults to attend Christian conferences and trainings. We want to use this money to help people directly. These funds are available to all members of Mt. Calvary. If you'd like financial help to attend a Christian camp, conference, concert, or training, talk to Pastor Vanderbilt or Aaron because the Cans Fund is available to everyone.

A couple of years ago, we received a very large memorial gift. The Council recommended and the Congregation approved creating three special funds with this gift. Let's review the three funds created by this gift and how they are used.

Generation to Generation Endowment Fund: 70% of the gift was used to establish an endowment. Think of this like a retirement fund where we don't want to spend the principle but allow that principle to grow so that a portion of this fund can subsidize our General Fund each year. 2024 was the first year where we realized some earnings from this fund, and we were able to add \$25,000 to our General Fund to help us meet our regular budgeted expenses.

Local Ministry Fund: 20% of the memorial gift was put into this fund to allow us to dream about the future. Many times in ministry, an important opportunity comes up, but a church doesn't have the finances to meet that need. This fund is set aside so that we will have funds for future opportunities. So far, we've used those funds to purchase a church van, to resource our meals in the park, and to hire a choir director in the short-term. These funds are also available for members of Mt. Calvary. If you have an idea for a new ministry but you aren't sure where to start or how to fund it, Pastor Vanderbilt can help you.

Mission Giving: 10% of the memorial gift was set aside to give to causes and organizations *outside* of Mt. Calvary. Just as the Bible encourages us to tithe to the Church, we felt it was important to share a portion of this gift with others in our community and the church at large. We used a portion of these funds in 2024 to help install a Baby Box at MercyOne in Des Moines.

We hope this helps you to understand Mt. Calvary's finances a bit more. If you still have questions, feel free to talk to Pastor Vanderbilt or Mt. Calvary's treasurer, Chad Kuehl.
